BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In 2007, the Saint Patrick's Church Restoration Society was incorporated, separate and apart from the Parish, with the purpose of restoring a beautiful, valuable, historic church building, with the alternative of the church being torn down. In June 2009, the Restoration Society, a registered charity, assumed responsibility for paying substantial non-liturgical operating costs as well as for the maintenance and restoration of Saint Patrick's Church. By accepting this responsibility, Saint Patrick's Church was saved from closure and almost certain destruction.

In November 2009, the weekly oil bills for Saint Patrick's averaged \$4,000.00 or \$12,000.00 a month. At the end of November, during a furnace cleaning, 2 of the 3 boilers disintegrated. This required a complete overhaul of the sub basement which included a hazardous waste audit and removal of waste that dated back to the old coal furnace, an electrical, mechanical and architectural study and completion of the recommended work, and the installation of the new gas furnace, pipes, etc. The Society paid significant costs up front and took a lease for \$100,000.00 on the remainder of the costs. To date, by paying on average \$2,300.00 a month, we have paid down the lease by \$50,000.00 and have \$50,000.00 left to pay. We pay \$1,500.00 a month on our yearly gas bill. This is a substantial saving over the cost of oil and the furnace has a life of at least 50 years. If the Restoration Society had not installed the furnace and done the required work in the sub basement, Saint Patrick's Church would have closed forever.

The Board of the Restoration Society would like to pay off the remaining \$50,000.00 of the furnace lease as soon as possible so they can focus on the necessary repair of the bell tower, and other parts of the building that are absolutely necessary if the building is to survive. This Christmas season, the Restoration Society is asking Nova Scotians to consider making a donation to assist with either the payments for the furnace lease or the monthly fuel bill to help us maintain and preserve one of the most beautiful and historically significant buildings in the province.

No gift is too large or too small and will be gratefully received.

Within 72 hours of receiving a donation to the furnace fund or the fuel fund, the money will be deposited in the Restoration Society's bank account, as designated for the furnace lease or the gas contract, and a tax receipt for the full amount will be sent to the donor. 

6 th Annual Dinner



He installed the main marble altar and surrounding stairs and pulpit, the 2 side altars which have a marble skim, purchased the organ once the women of the Parish raised the necessary money at a week long bake sale and fair on the grounds of what will be our new Halifax Library, had the stained glass windows installed and then replaced after the Halifax Explosion, purchased the Stations of the Cross, had the pews made of all the scrap lumber left over from the building of the Church but ensured that the Irish harp symbol was placed at each end of every pew, had shamrocks, lilies and roses hand made and placed at the top of the pillars of the Church and when the Church was damaged by the Halifax Explosion, he started all over again and restored the Church to its original splendour.

Monsignor Murphy was a champion of immigration issues, social justice and education. He raised the money to purchase the land and was involved in the building of Saint Patrick's Girls and Boys elementary schools and the Saint Patrick's Girls High School. From May to the end of September, youth came to the garden twice a week to plant, weed, water and harvest together, while also participating in various sport, art and music based activities as well as a few field trips.

This year we started up a JR leader program for 5 of our oldest youth. These youth took on a lot of responsibility including helping to plan and facilitate youth activities, acting as positive role models for the younger youth and maintaining the green-

We plan to continue growing cool season crops in the greenhouse through the fall and are just starting up our 3rd year of organic salad dressing production and sales.

On December 2, 2012, Elsie and Frank Flinn were recognized by the Restoration Society as our 'Volunteers of the Year' for their outstanding support, guidance and participation in the work of the Society.
